Children will learn about:

English:

- * Fiction: The Queen's knickers by Nicholas Allen, The Queen's hat and the Queen's handbag by Steve Antony
- Narrative with predictable phrasing: Fortunately, Unfortunately by Michael Foreman, Handa's Surprise by Eileen Browne, the song London Bridge is falling down, Would you rather...? By Camilla de la Bedoyere and Mel Howell
- * Non-fiction recounts and diaries using Katie in London by James Mayhew
- * Poetry - My village: rhymes from around the world by Danielle Wright and Migue Moriuchi
- * A poem a day for the year: I am the seed that grew into the tree

Maths:

- * White Rose block two (second half) = Addition and subtraction
- * White Rose block three = Geometry
- * White Rose block four = Number and place value within 20

Science:

- * Ask simple questions and use equipment to measure and make observations.
- * Gather and record simple data in a range of ways (data tables, diagrams, Venn diagrams).
- * Observe and describe weather associated with the seasons and how day length varies—Winter focus

Art:

- * Draw or paint a place from memory, imagination or observation.

Geography:

- * Name and locate the four countries of the UK and their capital cities on a map, atlas or globe.
- * Use basic geographical vocabulary to identify and describe physical features, such as beach, cliff, forest etc.
- * Identify the characteristics of a settlement such as a city.
- * Carry out fieldwork tasks to identify characteristics of the school grounds or locality.
- * Name and describe the purpose of human features and landmarks.
- * Identify features and landmarks on an aerial photograph or plan perspective.
- * Use simple directional and positional language to give directions, describe locations and discuss where things are.
- * Identify the similarities and differences between two places (London/Kuala Lumpur)
- * Name important buildings and places and explain their importance
- * Draw or read a simple picture map.

History:

- * Describe a significant historical event in British history—The Gunpowder Plot
- * Learn about significant historical events, people and places in their own locality.
- * Identify some key features of a significant historical event beyond living memory.

Computing: Rising Stars Unit 1:2 We are TV chefs = Filming and editing the steps of a recipe.

Music: Charanga unit 1—Rhythm in the way we walk and the Banana rap— Explore singing together, rhythm, dynamics, pitch and tempo.

RE: Unit 1:2— Why does Christmas matter to Christians? How and why do we celebrate special times? Explore stories in the bible and discuss as a class.

PE: Gymnastics with a focus on body shapes. Ball skills with a focus on dribbling and finding a space.

PSHE: Jigsaw unit 2—Celebrating Differences—Learning about similarities, differences, acceptance and tolerance
